Pick of the week

Getting married can be a painful process at the best of times but for Steve and Michaela, the subject of Modern Times — A Jewish Wedding, the process was especially fraught.

Michaela is a Jewish girl from Gants Hill. Steve is a blonde, blueeyed boy from Upminster who isn't Jewish, but is undergoing a conversion

The documentary follows the couple through the psychological — and, for Steve, the physical — trauma leading up to the big day.

Directed by Stephen Walker, this affectionate film investigates the gulf between Michaela's and Steve's worlds as it takes takes them from shidduch to chupah. And watch out for a wonderful cameo performance from Bernie Aidallbery — if there was an Oscar for Best Caterer in a Supporting Role, it would be his.

"Modern Times — A Jewish Wedding" is screened on BBC2 at 9pm on Wednesday.

According to Julia, the drama, which opens next week as part of the New End Theatre's new Jewish plays season, works as a satire and also serves to establish a connection between the black and Jewish communities, between whom relations have often been strained.
